COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT 2022

SUMMARY

To help inform future decisions and strategic planning, South Limestone Hospital District – Limestone Medical Center (LMC) conducted a community health needs assessment (CHNA) in 2022, the previous CHNA having been conducted in 2017. The assessment consisted of soliciting input from area community members and healthcare professionals as well as analysis of community health-related data.

To gather feedback from the community, residents of the area were given the opportunity to participate in a survey. 154 LMC service area residents completed the survey. Additional information was collected through several key informant interviews with community members. The input from the residents, who primarily reside in Limestone County, represented the broad interests of the communities in the service area. Together with secondary data gathered from a wide range of sources, the survey presents a snapshot of the health needs and concerns in the community.

Limestone County Demographic summary: (see appendix B)

- Limestone County's population from 2010 to 2020 decreased (5.29%). Total County population is 23,417.
- The average of residents under age 18 (22.52%) for Limestone County is nearly 3% lower the Texas state average (25.97%).
- The percentage of residents ages 65 and older for Limestone County (18.74%) is over 5% greater than Texas average (12.25%).
- Population with a disability in Limestone County is (16.85%) which is almost 5% greater than the Texas average of (11.47%)
- Population with limited English proficiency is (9.41%) less than the Texas average of (13.74%).
- Unemployment rate is (5.5%) greater than the Texas average of (4.7%).
- Labor Force participation rate for Limestone County is 52.29%, significantly lower than the Texas average of 64.24%
- The median household income for Limestone County is (\$44,418) significantly less when compared to the Texas state average of (\$61,874).
- Children in Limestone County below 100% poverty under the age of 18 (32.75%), much greater than the state average of (20.92%)
- Population with a Bachelors degree or higher is (14.83%) far less than the Texas state average of (29.90%) which contributes to the disparity in wages.

Respondent Demographics:

- The average age of respondent was over 25 years old with input from all age ranges.
- The education level of respondents was comparable. Most had at least some college (N=100) with (N=21) with graduate degrees.

HISTORY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCES

Limestone County is a county in the U.S. state of Texas. As of the 2020 census, its population was 22,146. Its county seat is Groesbeck. The county was created in 1846. Groesbeck was founded in 1871 and named for early railroad man, Abraham Groesbeck. On April 12, 1871, a post office was established and the name was listed as "Groesbeck." The spelling became the official city name. Located on State Highways 14 and 164, just 35 miles from IH 35 at Waco to the west, and only 30 miles from IH 45 to the east, we are 2.5 hours from Houston, and approximately 2 hours from Dallas.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

The purpose of conducting a CHNA is to describe the health of local people, identify areas for health improvement, identify use of local healthcare services, determine factors that contribute to health issues, identify and prioritize community needs, and help healthcare leaders identify potential action to address the community's health needs.

A CHNA benefits the community by:

- 1) Collecting timely input from the local community members, providers, and staff;
- 2) Providing an analysis of secondary data related to health-related behaviors, conditions, risks, and outcomes;
- 3) Compiling and organizing information to guide decision making, education, and marketing efforts, and to facilitate the development of a strategic plan;
- 4) Engaging community members about the future of healthcare; and
- 5) Allowing the community hospital to meet the federal regulatory requirements of the Affordable Care Act, which requires not-for-profit hospitals to complete a CHNA at least every three years, as well as helping the local public health unit meet accreditation requirements.

This assessment examines health needs and concerns in Limestone County.

As part of the assessment's overall collaborative process, LMC spearheaded efforts to collect data for the assessment in a variety of ways:

- A survey solicited feedback from area residents;
- Community leaders representing the broad interests of the community took part in oneon-one key informant interviews;
- The community focus group, comprised of community leaders and area residents, was convened to discuss area health needs and inform the assessment process; and
- A wide range of secondary sources of data were examined, providing information on a multitude of measures, including demographics, health conditions, indicators, outcomes, rates of preventive measures; rates of disease; and at-risk behavior.

LIMESTONE MEDICAL CENTER

Limestone Medical Center (LMC) in Groesbeck, Texas is a 20-bed Critical Access Hospital with a 5 bed emergency room offering convenient access, located directly off of HWY 14. Accredited as a Level IV Trauma Center by the Department of State Health Services. LMC proudly serves the citizens of Limestone County, Freestone County Hill County, also, Leon County, Robertson County, and Navarro County. The hospital is situated on a beautiful campus and is open to all communities. We currently serve many communities including, Groesbeck, Mexia, Kosse, Bremond, Thornton and many others.

There were a variety of suggestions but the one thing that stands out is the need for more availability of providers, PCP and Specialists.

SURVEY

A survey was distributed to solicit feedback from the community and was not intended to be a scientific or statistically valid sampling of the population. It was designed to be an additional tool for collecting qualitative data from the community at large – specifically, information related to community-perceived health needs. A copy of the survey instrument is included in Appendix A and a full listing of direct responses provided for the questions that included "Other" as an option. The community member survey was distributed to in various ways including handing out at our LMC Healthfair, taken to local Senior Community Center and posting link online and on social media.

The survey tool was designed to:

- Learn of the good things in the community and the community's concerns;
- Understand perceptions and attitudes about the health of the community and hear suggestions for improvement; and
- Learn more about how local health services are used by residents.

Specifically, the survey covered the following topics:

- Broad areas of community and health concerns;
- Awareness of local health services;
- Barriers to using local healthcare;
- Basic demographic information;
- Suggestions to improve the delivery of local healthcare; and
- Suggestions for capital improvements.

INTERVIEWS WITH COMMUNITY MEMBERS

On 5/10/2022 we met with Emily Fisher, the Texas Agri-life Extension program for Limestone County. She informed us about many programs the have to offer. She had various training programs about tobacco cessation, dangers of vaping, etc. She is available to schedule these sessions upon request.

On 5/10/22 we also met with the Limestone County Emergency Management coordinator Matt Groveton. Mr. Groveton had many complements for Limestone Medical Center. He said is a "fantastic hometown hospital, always professional and nice". We discussed the problem of getting information out to the public.

On 5/25/2022 we met with Limestone County Judge Richard Duncan. Judge Duncan also had praise for the healthcare available in Limestone County. We are fortunate to have two hospitals

in our county to take care of our community. We spoke about the issue of poverty and food insecurity. He told me to try the Texas state wide 211 phone number for all resources in the community including food pantries, child care options and housing. Judge Duncan also informed us that he is excited that we are getting about 18 new cell towers in the county thought funding from the state. This will help with cell and internet reception throughout the county.

REARCH AND FINDINGS

RESOURCES

One of the primary concerns of community members surveyed and interviewed was lack of available resources. We discovered that there are many resources available there is just lack of awareness. To find out some of the resources available I called 211 and received some great information about services available to Limestone County residents. Here are a few examples:

2. Rural Public Transportation offered by Heart of Texas Council of Governments

Description: Provides rural transportation to those in need in Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and Freestone counties. McLennan County transportation services are provided by Waco Transit.

3. Community Services offered by Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation (EOAC)

Description: Provides utility assistance for qualified applicants through the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program (CEAP), including help with Atmos Energy gas bills, propane, and electric bills. Provides motel and housing for victims of disasters. Provides assistance with water bills through the LIHWAP water program. Application is the same as for the CEAP program. NOTE: Water must be disconnected or household must have received a disconnect notice to qualify. Applications are available (and accepted) in the EOAC vestibule. 4. Emergency Assistance offered by Caritas of Waco

Description: Provides direct aid for emergency needs such as -clothing, -food, -TXU, Ambit, Tri-Eagle, and Reliant electricity (only), -transportation (only with case management.) -Prescription medicine help, only if funding is available, and not all types of prescriptions can be covered. Diapers, toiletries, and feminine hygiene products when inventory is available. Fans available beginning 5/31/2022 Food assistance will be walk-in only. No appointment necessary. Hours are now 8:30 a.m. – 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. – 2:45 p.m. Clients should park in the spaces along Mary Avenue and enter through the door marked "Client Entrance." ONE person per household. Photo ID is required. Waiting rooms are limited to 25 people. Senior boxes are available during food pantry hours on any day. There is no "Seniors Only" day at this time. ACTIVITIES

- Maffett Memorial Public Library in Groesbeck
- Groesbeck Park
- Groesbeck Sports Complex
- Groesbeck Public swimming pool
- Texas A&M AgriLife Extension services offers many education courses to the community. Emily Fisher is the Director. She takes education centers on various topics such as Tobacco and Vaping cessation and awareness classes to the Mexia, Groesbeck and area school and senior citizen centers upon request. She has education courses available on 100s of topics including suicide prevention and depression awareness. She is a valuable resource the entire Limestone County Community.
- Fort Parker State Park has many activities for all ages and the Ranger programs offers monthly events.

CONCLUSION

The citizens of Limestone County are very satisfied with the health care available in our community. Limestone Medical Center is "fantastic" hospital offering a wide variety of services.




Recommended Action

Q1 Considering the COMMUNITY /ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH in your community, concerns are (choose up to THREE):








Q2 Considering the AVAILABILITY/DELIVERY OF HEALTH SERVICES in your community, concerns are (choose up to THREE):








Q3 Considering the YOUTH POPULATION in your community, concerns are (choose up to THREE):








Q4 Considering the ADULT POPULATION in your community, concerns are (choose up to THREE):





Q5 Considering the SENIOR POPULATION in your community, concerns are (choose up to THREE):





Q8 Considering PRIMARY HEALTHCARE, where do you primarily receive your Healthcare: (choose one)



Q9 What PREVENTS community residents from receiving healthcare? (Choose ALL that apply)










